

# **English**

## Children study a variety of texts including:

## Fantastically Great Women who Changed the World

Children will write a report about a historical figure and follow their achievements and life experiences.

#### Wonder

Children will write a Newspaper Article inspired by the events in R.J. Palacio's Wonder.

### A Poem as Big as New York City

Children will write their own poem about our school community.

## **Maths**



#### Area and Perimeter

Children continue to measure and calculate the perimeter and area and rectilinear shapes. They do this using practical methods, pictorial representations and abstract calculations.

#### Decimals

Children expand their knowledge of place value and fractions to include numbers with decimals. They learn to add and subtract with up to two decimal places.

#### Position and Direction

Children describe positions of co-ordinates on a grid and movements between positions.

#### **Properties of Shape**

Children identify acute and obtuse angles and lines of symmetry within 2D shapes.

#### Time

Children read, write and convert between analogue and digital, 12 and 24 clocks.

# **Science**



#### Sound

During this topic the children investigate how different sounds are made through vibrations and how they travel through the ear. They investigate tone and pattern of sound and how sounds get fainter the further away you travel.

# Science (continued)



## **Living Things and their Habitats**

During this topic the children sort and classify living things. They explore and use classification keys to help sort groups. They refer back to their work on rainforests and how environments can be threatened.

## RF



#### **New Life**

Children retell some special stories about the religious events and people connected with Pentecost. They describe some ways in which the apostles spread the Good News through the power of the Holy Spirit.

## **Building Bridges**

Children use a developing religious vocabulary to describe some religious actions and symbols in the sacrament of reconciliation.

## God's People

Children retell some special stories about religious events and people who show what God is like and show understanding of how religion has shaped the way some people live out their lives.

# **Geography**



#### What is New York like?

During this topic, the children locate North America and investigate and research its key human and physical features. They explore maps of America and predict what four contrasting places will be like based on their proximity. They go on to study New York. They use a range of multimedia to research the main features of the city. They create a link with a school in New York and compare the physical features and human features of Bolton and New York.



# **History**

## How did life in Britain change during the Tudor reign?

The children use a range of sources to build their understanding of what life was like during the Tudor times. They focus on King Henry 8<sup>th</sup> and the impact his reign had on Britain including the impact it had on the Church. The children's learning will be enhanced with a drama workshop in school-focussing on daily life in Tudor times.

# PE



#### **Athletics**

Children learn running and sprinting techniques including a crouch start. They practise throwing techniques for athletics events including shot-put, javelin and discus. Children also learn jumping techniques for athletics events including long jump, triple jump and speed bounce.

#### **Cricket and Rounders**

Children learn underarm and overarm bowling techniques; how to increase accuracy and how to bowl at different speeds. They learn how to handle a cricket bat and execute various shots including straight drive and sweep shot. They also play games to practise using their skills.

# Computing



# Information Technology

The children use key words and search for images and text on the world wide web to support their learning in history. They then use these images and text to create a non-fiction photo story using Video Editor.



## Art

## Selfies through the Ages

During the Tudor topic, the children study portraits of monarchs (focus on Henry VIII and Elizabeth I). They discuss the similarities between the Tudor monarchs and compare ideas, methods and approaches to their own and other works and say what they think and feel about it. The children create portraits of each other in the style of the Tudor monarchs wearing appropriate clothing and headwear etc. The children compare these paintings with modern selfies. Discuss how people throughout history have altered their appearances for various reasons.



# **French**

During this term, children learn to count to 100 in French. They practise using adjectives, verbs, masculine and feminine nouns in their speaking and writing activities. Children also retell a well-known French story. They learn some French phrases about fruit, healthy foods and sports.

# **PSCHE**

## **Physical Health and Fitness**

Children recognise mental and physical benefits of an active lifestyle and the principles of planning and preparing a range of healthy meals. They understand the risks associated with unhealthy eating and an inactive lifestyle.



## Music

In this unit, the children's main focus will be on learning crotchet and quaver notation and learning to listen and notate 4 beat rhythms. They will be singing multiple songs about a healthy lifestyle (both in diet and in mind) and will be tying this into the rhythmic notation work that we do. We will also be looking briefly at the different compositions specified on BBC 10 pieces (see below). We will be using warm up activities to further our notation work.
