KEY STICKY KNOWLEDGE		
Know how Britain changed between the beginning of the Stone Age and the Iron Age	Know The Stone Age was when the first humans lived in Britain – they used stones as tools	Know during the iron age, people used iron to make tools and began to farm land as well as hunt
Know an 'age' starts when a country or area starts using that material. Historian split them into 'ages' to identify what was different about them	Know The Bronze Age followed The Stone Age and was when metal was first used for tools	Know The Iron Age ended in 43 AD when The Romans Invaded Britain

HISTORICAL VOCABULARY	
achievements	when you do something successfully with effort and skill
farming	the business of growing crops and raising livestock
settlements	is a place where people live and can be permanent or temporary
Bronze Age	is the name given to the period of time between the Stone and Iron Age. Bronze was used to make tools and weapons
hunter gathers	a members of a nomadic people
Iron Age	a prehistoric period that followed the Bronze Age, when weapons and tools came to be made of iron
Mesolithic	it existed between the Old Stone Age and the New Stone Age. It is also called Middle Stone Age
Neolithic	is also called New Stone Age and is the final stage of development among prehistoric humans
Palaeolithic	this is the earliest period of the Stone Age characterised by rough or chipped stone implements
CE/BCE	CE stands for common era and BCE stands for before the common era
Stone Age	a prehistoric period when weapons and tools were made of stone or of organic materials such as bone, wood or horn
prehistoric	is the period before written records
archaeologist	a person who studies human history and prehistory through the excavation of sites

Skara Brae	is one of Britain's most fascinating prehistoric villages found on the Orkney Islands off the north of Scotland
tools	a device or implement usually held in the hand used to carry out a particular function
